## Women's Fellowship Visits St. John the Forerunner Greek Orthodox Monastery

On a rainy Monday, October 20th, seventeen women from our church traveled ten miles past Goldendale, Washington to visit St. John the Forerunner Greek Orthodox Monastery. It was an incredible field trip for us all. We were definitely enlightened and impressed by our visitation as our spirit was not dampened in the least by the weather. After we drove a short distance on the Monastery grounds, we found the outer walls of the Orthodox Church still under construction. Once inside we were in awe of the interior's beauty. It has been gorgeously completed with striking Icons, inlaid marble floors, and artistically designed wooden carvings along the walls, the altar and the chairs. Incredibly, all have been hand-crafted by Orthodox Christians in Greece and sent over. Eventually, lighting fixtures will be hung once they arrive from Greece. The nun who guided us through the tour was very sweet, articulate and inspirational as she informed us about her daily life at the Monastery, this particular Greek Orthodox Church that started in Goldendale in 1995, and the Greek Orthodox Church in general.

After our tour, we stopped at the St. Johns Bakery Coffee and Gifts on the edge of Highway 97 but still on the Monastery property. Many of us made purchases of hand-crafted items and the delicious bakery goods, like Baklava and Biscotti. The nuns do all the baking for the Bakery which also includes Greek food items like Gyro, Lamb and Manestra, Mousakas and Pastitsio. In addition, they make many of the hand-crafted items of soaps, lotions, Beeswax candles and incense.

The Icons are painted by them, too, when they have time. The following information is provided for your interest as quoted from the brochure titled "Welcome to St. John the Forerunner Greek Orthodox Monastery". "The Holy Greek Orthodox Monastery of St. John the Forerunner was founded in 1995, when local Doctor Gerard Johannes Timmer donated his 48-acre property to the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of San Francisco for the foundation of a women's monastic community. His Eminence the late Metropolitan Anthony, of blessed memory, accepted the donation, and contacted Elder Ephraim to help establish the monastery in Washington State." "Since 1995 the sisterhood increased from three founding sisters to more than 20 nuns and novices. Here in the Pacific Northwest, as in many other places, young, Orthodox women are devoting themselves to God and a life of prayer despite the confused state of modern society."

The brochure states that, "the Orthodox Church is the first Christian church, founded by the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. Her history can be traced in unbroken continuity back to the original Pentecost, the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles. The Orthodox Church has continued in her undiminished and unaltered faith and practice and today her apostolic doctrine, worship and structure remain intact."
