When I was in grad school, most of my peers were enamored with fly-fishing. They loved to exchange stories of stealth and cunning. They spoke endlessly of equipment, techniques and reading slight breezes on the water. Their enthusiasm was contagious, so when a group of us were headed up to the Wind River Range in Wyoming for a research project, I thought I'd give it a try. Outfitted with a fly rod and hand-tied flies, I waded into the Wind River hoping for fish for dinner. Turns out fly-fishing takes two things I did not possess, skill and a steady hand. I did not so much as catch fish as give them an experience akin to the rapture. One minute they were swimming in a clear mountain stream, the next minute they were flying through the air at a high rate of speed. I caught seven trout that day, they looked windblown.

I took a lot of grief and smirking from my colleagues. They loved to tell the story of my fishing prowess. They seemed to never tire of it. As far as they were concerned, my foray into their elite sport was a total failure. I disagree. What I remember about that experience is the clarity and gurgle of the water, warm sun on my back while standing

in the headwaters of the Wind River under a blue sky. Despite my friends shouting, "incoming", I remember that dome of grace and experienced peace, joy, and the majesty of creation.

The world has strict rules about what is a success and what is not. If we are not paying attention, we may even believe that the world's pronouncements are true, that the world's values are real. As Christians, we know that Holy Week and Easter upend the judgment and values of the world. The powers that be were dead wrong when they thought the crucifixion of Christ ended their problem.

The words of Jesus, "not as the world gives, do I give to you" should be seared into our souls and minds. God does things differently and gives us a covenant, a promise and a resurrected Savior that we might know we are loved, always. Good Friday looks like failure; it looks like death, but God had something else in mind. That something is a new way of being in the world that gives abundant life to all people. We are called to follow in that way and be the witnesses to God's truth in Jesus Christ. Look hard at what you think is failure and death. Hear the whispers of failure, "He is risen. He is risen, indeed." Happy Easter.

Sherman Alexie Is Coming We Have Tickets

Sherman Alexie, a Native American author, is coming to The Dalles as part of the American Indian Cultural Festival. We (UCCC) contributed monies, through our Hanna grant, to help bring this well-known author to speak to our communities' kids. On April 13, he will be speaking to all third graders in six counties. We have been given four tickets to this very special event. We will be raffling off these tickets the first Sunday of April. Interested? All you have to do is put your name in the hat.



Mill Creek Conservation Area

The second event will be held following church service on Sunday, April 30th. Bruce Lumper will lead a hike along the ridge between Mill Creek and Brown's Creek. This area is the Mill Creek Conservation Area. The Columbia Land Trust is the organization that now owns and manages this area. It covers 418 acres and 2 plus contiguous miles of ridgeline. We will carpool from the church to the public access entry just off Cherry Heights Road. The hike up to the ridge is about 1/2 mile. We will then hike to the penultimate view on top of Jerry's Knoll, this is a hike of about 1/2 mile and climb an additional 110 ft. This will be our picnic spot. We will hope for little wind and for the flowers to be out. There should also be migrant birds about. Anywhere we walk should be pretty enjoyable. Folks should bring a pair of binoculars for the birds, cameras for the flowers, a walking stick and a day pack for your picnic lunch and water. Hiking shoes or tennis shoes would be fine. Sunscreen and sunglasses are a good idea.
